# **1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

# **1.1 INTRODUCTION**

PNG Government PG College, Ramnagar is a State Government college of Uttarakhand. It is a Co-educational college affiliated to Kumaon University, Nainital. The college is situated in the town of Ramnagar of the District Nainital. It was established in 1976. The college deals with the higher education needs of the semiurban and rural areas surrounding the town of Ramnagar. The town of Ramnagar is famous for Jim Corbett Wildlife Saunctary. The college started with six subjects of Arts Faculty, however, now the college imparts nineteen courses at graduate level and twelve courses at post-graduate level. The college also works as Research centre for the research scholars registered with the Kumaon University, Nainital. The college also runs six Diploma courses in Eco-tourism, Tour and Travel Management, Office Management, Tourism Studies, Computerised Accounting and Yoga & Alternate Cure. The Self-financing course in B.Ed is being conducted from 2008-09.The college follows reservation policy in the admission for all the courses according to the norms of the Uttarakhand Government.

The College has 46 sanctioned posts of teachers for Arts, Science and Commerce faculty, eight for Selffinancing B.Ed and two for self-financing post-graduate course in Yoga. The college has 46 sanctioned posts for non-teaching staff. The college is also the Study centre of Uttarakhand Open University. The students of the college engage in social activities for which the college has four wings of NSS, two wings of NCC and two wings of Rovers and Rangers. The students are encouraged to participate in Sports and Cultural activities. The college has a Boys Hostel with a capacity of forty students. The college has been conducting Seminars and Workshops for the academic extension of teachers and research scholars. The teachers participate in different Orientation and Refresher courses. They are also encouraged to publish research papers in Journals.

The college has a highly enriched library with 25000 books and journals. The college is under the process of digitisation of the library also. The College has been granted funds under the RUSA scheme of MHRD with 2.01 crores in first phase and 2 crores in the second phase.

To impart holistic education based on the gospel values of love, justice, equality and peace to students from all strata of society and enable them to develop as intellectually matured morally upright, socially responsible and spiritually inspired leaders to serve the society and the nation.

- Harnessing research potential of faculty and to intensify a strong research climate through funded research projects in Humanities and Sciences.
- NAAC accredited with Grade 'B' which gave the college an opportunity to get funding under the RUSA Scheme of MHRD, Govt. of India.

#### Institutional Challenge

- The development of the college is restricted due to the dependency on the State Government policies.
- Strengthening and making the student competent for entrepreneurship development.
- Lack of autonomy at administrative and academic level.
- The students from the weaker socio-economic and rural background.

## **1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY**

#### **Curricular Aspects**

The college is affiliated to Kumaon University, Nainital and therefore the curriculum is implemented according to the syllabi designed by the University. During the assessment period of 2015-2020 thre post-graduate courses in Physics, History and Yoga were introduced in the college. The students are enrolled in six Diploma courses in Eco-tourism, Tour and Travel Management, Office Management, Tourism Studies, Computerised Accounting and Yoga & Alternate Cure. The students participate in value added courses with four wings of NSS, two wings of NCC and of Rovers-Rangers. The college conducts programs to promote gender sensitivity, environmental sustainability, human values and professional ethics along with the curriculum. The feedback is taken from the students and teachers. The results are analysed and the IQAC to make efforts hard to bring about improvements according to the feedback recommendations.

#### **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

The college caters to the higher education needs of the semi-urban and rural areas surrounding the town of

Ramnagar. Students hail from different socio-economic and religious backgrounds. More than fifty percent of the students of the college are females. All these factors have led to high enrollment ratio of the college. The college abides by the reservation rules of the Uttarakhand Government in the admission process. The college makes efforts to improve the performance of both slow and advanced learners. The Departments of the college organize different academic and non-academic activities to expedite the learning process of the students. The teachers are encouraged to use ICT tools in teaching. Very high majority of teachers working in the college are holding Ph.D degrees and those who are not holding are under the process of completing their Ph.D. The teachers have a good teaching experience in years. Many teachers also hail from other States of India.

The college conducts Internal evaluation in the form of assignments, seminars, group discussions. Grievances are given priority and efforts are made to rectify them with transparency. The college adheres to the Academic Calendar and the same is uploaded on the website along with the program outcomes of all courses offered by the college. The pass percentage of the students is more than sixty percent.

#### **Research, Innovations and Extension**

The college is encouraging the teachers to engage in research and extension activities. Career Counseling Cell is actively engaged in the conduct of different job oriented workshops National Seminars and lectures. Workshop on SPSS and IPR was also organized to promote learning awareness of the students. The teachers have published papers in different journals and books. The teachers are registered as Research guides and during the last five years five research scholars registered under the college teachers have been awarded with Ph.D degree.

The students are also engaged in different neighborhood activities related to Swacchh Bharat, Blood donation, Environmental Awareness etc. NSS, NCC and Rovers and Rangers are engaged in the different social activities to make local community engaged and aware. The students participate in Student Exchange Programs through NCC camps and Ek Bharat Shrestha Bharat Club.

#### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

The college was established in 1976 and has grown from a college offering under-graduate course in six subjects to Post-graduate college offering nineteen under-graduate courses, twelve post-graduate courses and Research centre for Ph.D courses. The college has a large campus with an Administrative block, two Academic blocks, a playground, one boys hostel, Principal and Hostel Warden's residence. The college has seven classrooms which are enabled with ICT tools.

The college has an enriched library with 25000 books and journals which is under the process of Digitalization. The college has subscribed to INFLIBNET and N-LIST. The college has been allotted with funds under RUSA for the purchase of books, construction of new library building, toilets and computer centre. In this the college has purchased books and constructed library and construction of computer centre is under process.

The college has 58 computers and laptops which are used for e-library, departments and office of the college. The college has internet facility for teachers and students and free Wi-Fi has been made available under the JioPrivate Net Scheme.

Laboratories of the practical subjects are well equipped. There are separate labs for under-graduate and postgraduate students. RUSA has provided funds for the updation of equipments of the labs.

#### **Student Support and Progression**

Government of Uttarakhand offers scholarships for SC, ST and OBC students under different schemes. The college makes provisions that the students of SC, ST and OBC Category avail these scholarships. The college has an active Career Counseling Cell which is engaged in the conduct different career oriented workshops and lectures. The college offers a Diploma course in Yoga and Alternate cure which is promoting application of Yoga for daily wellness of the students. Personal Counseling is carried out by the teachers during their regular teaching hours. Soft Skill development programs was also conducted under UTKARSH Scheme.

The college has Anti-ragging Cell, Women's Grievance Redressal Cell along with Internal Complaint Committee and Grievance Redressal Cell. These cells conduct meetings and the minutes are uploaded on the website for the reference of all the stakeholders. During the assessment no student grievance case was reported.

The students have a high rate of progression to higher education. The students participate in different job oriented competitive examinations have been successful in the same. The Sports Department of the college is highly active and the players/ Sportspersons brought medals in different Sports activities in recent Academic sessions. The Sports department also organizes Annual Sports and one event of Inter-Collegiate level in the college. The college also has Student Council which is formed according to the recommendations of Lyndoh Committee. The student participation is ensured in different activities of the college.

The Alumni of the college participate in different functions of the college and have also contributed in different forms for the development of the college. The Alumni Association conducts one meeting every year, however, the association is not registered.

#### Governance, Leadership and Management

The governance of the college ensures the achievement of the Vision and Mission of the college. Different committees are formed to carry out the administrative and academic procedures. The Principal reviews the functioning of the committees on a regular basis. The college makes efforts to make Strategic plans for the development of the college. Allotment of funds under RUSA Phase I and Phase II can be seen as an example of the planning of the college, under which the college was given 201.12 lakhs and 200 lakhs respectively.

The college has provision of Casual Leaves, Child Care Leave, Earned Leave, Provident Scheme, Gratuity Scheme etc. as a welfare measure of teaching and non-teaching staff. The teachers are motivated to participate in Orientation, Refresher and Short-Term Courses for academic enrichment. The Accounts of the college are audited by the committee formed by Controller and Auditor General. The performance of the staff is evaluated on an annual basis through Confidential Reports.

IQAC is actively involved in quality enhancement of the college. It conducts meetings regularly and ensures quality initiatives in the form feedback system, effective admission process, conduct of seminars and workshops etc. IQAC has also taken steps according to the recommendations given by the previous PEER Team report.

#### **Institutional Values and Best Practices**

The college adopts institutional values in the form of Gender Sensitivity programs conducted by the Women's Cell especially on the Women's day. More than 55 percent of the students are females, therefore the college ensures the conduct of awareness programs related to Women's Rights through NSS, NCC and Rovers-Rangers. The college has a separate Common Room for the female students. Women's Grievance Redressal Cell and ICC have been formed to prevent sexual harassment in the college.

The college has installed four Solar lights in the campus which generates 800 KWH power for the campus. The college also believes in saving energy through the use of LED in the campus. The college has provisions for solid and liquid waste management. Rain-water harvesting system has also been constructed in the new library building, made under the RUSA scheme.

The students of the college use public vehicles for commuting to the college. A few staff members of the college use pooled-car system which is an indication of environmental awareness among the students and teachers of the college. Provision of Rest rooms, Wheel-chair, ramps and scribes for the differently abled students.

The college celebrates the birth and death anniversaries of famous personalities along with Independence Day, Republic Day, Shaurya Diwas and other days commensurating Universal Values of Love, Brotherhood, Harmony etc. The college executes community engagement through blood donation, Voters awareness program, gender sensitivity programs.

The college has been able to promote research and extension activities among the teachers of the college.

#### **2.2 Catering to Student Diversity**

**2.2.1** The institution assesses the learning levels of the students, after admission and organises special programs for advanced learners and slow learners

#### **Response:**

The admission of the college is managed and completed by the committees formed for all the three faculties. The students are required to fill online application forms on the Kumaon University website. The merit list is provided to the college by the University, on the basis of which admission process is done. Both horizontal and vertical Reservation policy is followed in enrolling the students. After the admission process is completed the departments are provided with the list of students for both under-graduate and post-graduate courses. The college has initiated an Orientation program for the under-graduate students. Students enrolling in the first year of under-graduate course in all the three faculties attend the program. They are introduced to the pattern of course carried out in the college. Teachers of all the departments give their introduction, along with the briefing about the different administrative work handled by each of them.

All the departments organise counselling sessions in their respective classes. The teachers brief the students about the syllabi and carry out the identification of students with advanced and slow learning process, by conducting a brief test. For example, BA Ist year of Economics has two papers i.e. Theories of Micro Economics and Quantitative Methods in Economics. The teachers conduct a brief test on basic quantitative methods to test the abilities of the students as the students being admitted in the BA program of Economics come from both Maths and non-Maths group. The non-Maths students are identified and they are given additional questions on basic Mathematics so that they can catch up with the students with higher learning capabilities. Other departments also conduct similar procedures. At the post-graduate level interactive sessions are carried out between First year and Final Year students through which the final year students guide the previous year students of the relateddepartment.

At the mid-session test, seminars and group discussions are conducted by all the departments which helps in assessing the learning abilities of the students. The slow learners are given more assignments and the teachers evaluate the assignments as and when required. The advanced learners are also guided by communicating them with the different career options. Efforts are also made to improve the oral communication skills of slow learners by making the seminars and group discussions compulsory for them. Under very specific cases personal counselling is also conducted by the teachers.

**2.3.1** Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

#### **Response:**

PNG Govt. PG College, Ramnagar makes efforts to enhance learning experiences of the students of all faculties. The college has set up seven ICT equipped and one EDUSAT classrooms through which the teachers can use ICT techniques for teaching. The post-graduate students are encouraged to learn the use of Powerpoint presentations for departmental seminars and group discussions. The teachers provide the students with the past year question papers and notes in their respective classes.

Departmental Councils are formed by each department which works as an interactive platform between student-student and student-teacher. The councils conducts quiz, elocution, play presentation, seminars, group discussions, cleanliness programs, participation in rallies, poster competition, etc. The students are encouraged by giving them prizes on their performance. The students of the Science Faculty prepare Models on the related topics and they are put up for display.

The college has EDUSAT system through which the students can learn from the lectures given by the teachers from out of college. The schedule of lectures is send from the Dehradun Office and the same is circulated among the departments. The respective departmental students attend the lectures for the assigned topic at the EDUSAT room. The students can also view the programs like MAN KI BAAT.

The college has a Reading Room where the students can assess journals and magazines to improve their

knowledge beyond the boundaries of curriculum designed by the University. The college organises Annual Sports Function where the students can participate in different sports activities and college representation is also made in Inter-Collegiate and Inter-University events. A Cultural Function is also organized named UMANG-TARANG where the dancing, singing and other cultural abilities of the students are encouraged.

#### 2.3.4 Innovation and creativity in teaching-learning

#### **Response:**

Innovation and creativity play a pivotal role in imparting various skills in the students. The college is catering to the higher education needs of the students from different socio-economic and cultural arenas.

- The college encourages teachers to impart lectures through ICT enabled techniques. With this motive the college has established seven ICT enabled classrooms.
- Twenty-three teachers of the college are registered as Research guides for the research scholars registered with Kumaon University, Nainital. To enhance the research work of students and teachers, the college has registered under INFLIBNET and N-LIST. Through this the teachers and students can access e-resources, e-books etc.
- The college has received funds through RUSA Scheme of MHRD, Government of India for Conversion of college to Model College (Component 9 of RUSA) and Infrastructural Facilities (Component 5 of RUSA). Through this the college has already constructed a New Library building and one Computer Centre and two classrooms are under construction. New books and equipments were also purchased under these schemes.
- For further enhancement of the higher education the college has opened Post-graduate course in

History, Physics in 2016-17 and in Yoga in 2019-20.

- The college has started "Ek Bharat Shrestha Bharat" Club, in which the students with participate in Youth Exchange, Teachers Exchange and other activities with its paired college of Karnataka.
- The students are encouraged to participate in different academic and non-academic activities like debates, quiz, Guest Lectures, FIT INDIA etc. conducted by the Departmental Councils.

#### **2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms**

#### 2.5.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

#### **Response:**

The college has initiated continuous internal evaluation (CIE) as per the guidelines and rules framed by Kumaun University, Nainital. Internal evaluation basically deals with the college itself and university also. Students assessment in continuous internal evaluation system at college level done by class tests, unit tests, tutorials, departmental seminars, departmental quiz, posters competition, debate, project work, practical examination and home assignments. Faculty members jointly decide the event to be organized and their time schedule. These activities are done transparently, any grievance regarding internal evaluation resolved in smooth manner by the department itself. Other than these, assignments are given to the students as per university requirements which provides marks to the students. These assignments evaluated by the teachers concerned and marks send to the university online.

College also initiated / established student's feedback system by which the college is able to understand the level of students' satisfaction regarding various aspect of institute and then corrective measures can be taken.

After admission the college organizes the orientation / induction program for the new comer students in which various kind of required information such as interaction to the concerned faculty members, Proctorial Board, Cultural Committee, Sports committee given to the students. Just after the induction program faculty members separately interacts with the faculty students and identifies fast learners and slow learners. The provision of extra tutorial and personal counseling made for the slow learners.

Continuous internal evaluation for teachers is done initially through the Time Table, Bio- Matrix Machine for Attendance, UGC norms of staying in the college is being strictly followed. Nodal officer is being appointed by the department of higher education, government of Uttarakhand who can raid any time for evaluation of college system as a whole. Faculty members continuously organizing seminars, conferences and workshop. Various full time teachers are appointed to fulfill the vacant post.

**Summative Assessment**: As far as the summative assessment is concerned, the institution follows a CentralizedContinuous Internal Evaluation System. The main objective of summative assessment is toevaluate student learning at regular intervals by conducting CIA Tests, Model Examinationsand Projects, Viva- Voce and Practical's. Academic performance of students is evaluated both by Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and University Semester Examinations.

Internal Marksare calculated on the basis of the marks secured in the tests, seminars/ assignments.. The test papers of both theory and practical are distributed to the students after every internal test. The students shall go through the answer script, check and acknowledge marks secured and return the paper to the faculty concerned. The test papers are preserved in the departments till the completion of the student's course of study. **Formative Assessment**: Formative assessment is part of the instructional processwhich is done by thefaculty concerned in their respective subjects to monitor student learning and to provide ongoing feedback to improve their teaching. Some of the formative assessments are

Summative assessment approach deals with centralized continuous internalevaluation and students' academic evaluation is directly done by this process. So, grievances related to this approach are: timely declaration of result, filling examination forms, submitting examination fees, timely submission of internal

assignments by the students and their marks by the faculty members.

All these kind of examination related grievances sorted out by the examination committee at its own level and few of the grievances which requires the interference of university that is being immediately sent to the person concerned in university with necessary documents by mail. Counter file of the same we kept with us for future communication if required. The code of conduct of examination is available in the college prospectus and on the web site of the institute. This is also available on the university portal. The same is displayed to the notice board to convey the students who are not in regular touch of internet.

The college has an internal compliant committee (ICC) constituted under the chairpersonship of principal to look into the serious matters and then appropriate measures are taken sensibly, transparently and within stipulated time limits.

Formative assessment approach is an important part of an institutional process which is done by the faculty concerned in their respective subjects. In this approach departments have their departmental councils, and the members of these departmental councils organizes various activities at department / faculty level with due consultation to the faculty members. These activities can be:

- Quiz competition
- Poster competition
- Role plays
- Group discussion
- Topic presentation

Topics related to the above activities / competitions are being told to the students well in advance and evaluation of the competition is done by the faculty members from other departments. The time schedule of above competitions is decided by the department itself.

### **3.4 Extension Activities**

**3.4.1** Extension activities in the neighbourhood community in terms of impact and sensitising students to social issues and holistic development during the last five years

### **Response:**

The College is conscious of its responsibilities for shaping students into responsibilities citizen of the country by making them aware of social issues and promote them to address these social issues to the neighborhood community. Two NCC units affiliated to 79/UK/BN/NCC/ Nainital and 24/GirlsUK/BN/NCC almora consisting 105 cadets and 88 girls cadets respectively. Three and half unit of NSS consisting 300 NSS volunteers and 32 Robers & Rangers are actively working in the college. The college organizes number of extension activities to promote institute neighborhood community association to sensitize the students towards the community needs to bring communal transformation in surrounding communities.

### Impact of extension activities in neighborhood communities:

Above mentioned three wings of the institute separately and sometimes jointly organizes and participate in programs like National Integrity Day, awareness rally on Swaccha Bharat Abhiyan, Sunder Teerth Swacch Teerth (Garjiya Temple), Blood Donation Camp, Voters Awareness Conference, Awareness on Road Security, Workshop on Sexual Harassment, Message on Drug Abuses, Differently Abled Voters Awareness, Voters verification workshop, Awareness on Environmental Issues, Rally on Plastic Prohibition, Awareness on Prohibition of E-Cigrete to make community aware and help them to follow the rules and sometimes it requires to change the habits.

NCC wing separately conducts various programs to the community like Beti Bachao- Beti Padao, rally on Gender Sensitization and Digital India. Various times Cleanliness Programs at college and out of college

organized by the NCC unit.

Rovers and Rengers wing conduct and participate in Save Tiger Exhibition, it hike to Gullarsidh Temple, organized cleanliness programs at college and participated in National Level Kumbh Mela Service Camp.

Every year college selects a village in the vicinity to organize a camp for seven days where mental and physical activities are carried out for volunteers; in these activities volunteers did Cleanliness Programs, Village Survey, Tree Plantation, Water Conservation through digging of Counter Trenches, Making Path and Roads.

Simultaneously these programs create awareness among people about the above mentioned activities and create a sense of responsibility. New issues can also be addressed to the society such as Rain Water Harvesting, Water Conservation etc.

**4.4.2** There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

**Response:** 

- Science Laboratories: there are adequate laboratory assistance in the science faculty. Department of Physics, Chemistry, Botany and Zoology has their own laboratory specific for under graduate and post graduate classes. The maintenance of these laboratories is done by the grant sanctioned annually by department of higher education, government of Uttarakhand and serviced by agencies / manufacturers as and when need arises. The stock in the lab is verified annually by Physical Verification Committee constituted by the principal. Electric and electronic equipments of laboratory are checked regularly at the end of every semester.
- **Computers:** 40 computers are available in the college out of which 16 computers are used in E-Library, 10 computers are used in computer lab, four used in administrative office and others are issued to the departments. A policy for maintenance of computers and equipments is followed by the higher education of Uttarakhand that a specific amount is sanctioned to the college once in a year for this purpose. College is taking fee from the students under the head "Computer Maintenance", this amount is also used for the maintenance of computers.
- Classrooms: the classroom facilities such as Blackboard, electric fittings and furniture etc. are

regularly maintaining out of the Maintenance fund.

- Library: college has a large library containing 55656 books, 158 Reference books and 355 journals. A team of energetic support staff looks after the maintenance of the library books, periodicals, furniture, electronic equipments and software. Librarian coordinates with the support staff that maintenance is done on regular basis and weeding of books is done periodically. We are in a process to digitize the library and till date we uploaded 20000 books on software.
- **Sports:** The sports complex comprises different playing fields, track & field and indoor stadium is regularly cleaned and well maintained even if we do not have full-fledged/qualified sport officer and specific support staff. Specific water pipe line with solar energy system is adopted to provide water to drink, to the toilets and others. The support staff involved in the required preparation of sports complex at the time college organizes various sports activities such as Intercollegiate Sports and Annual Sports Events. College organizes at least one intercollegiate sports event every year and also college annual sports which consists more than 20 events for boys and girls.

# **5.3.2** Presence of an active Student Council & representation of students on academic & administrative bodies/committees of the institution

College has student association elected by the students of the college. The election is conducted according to the rules and guidelines of state government and the affiliating university. Lyndoh committee recommendations are completely followed by the college. Students have been actively engaged in the academic and administrative functions as the college strongly believes in democratic values and provides opportunities to the students in supporting in co-curricular and extra –curricular activities conducted in the college. Students' direct representation is as follows:

- Departmental Councils: In every academic year, each department of the college conduct departmental student election to elect the members of departmental council which has six members at various positions. ### 6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 The governance of the institution is reflective of an effective leadership in tune with the vision and mission of the institution

### **Response:**

The college was established in 1976. It has its name in the memory of two prominent citizens of Ramnagar i.e. Nandkrishore Pyarelal Galbalia (PNG). The vision of the college is to impart quality higher education facilities "through a combination of self and external quality, promotion and sustenance activities". The college is governed under the headship of the Principal appointed by the Department of Higher Education, Uttarakhand Government. The Principal decentralizes the governance of the different administrative activities by forming different committees headed by a Senior teacher and two-three teachers as its members. These committees are formed annually at the beginning of the Academic year. The Convenor of the respective Committees conducts meeting with the members of the committee and chalks out the Plan of action. The college has separate office for Sports, Examination, Election, IQAC and RUSA. The Principal takes timely reviews of the functioning of the committees and resolves grievances, if any.

The Administrative staff looks into the different works and the college has a Senior Administrative Officer, one Administrative Officer, Steno and Divisional clerks. The administrative work is divided amongst them to promote "evaluation, promotion and sustenance".

The students also form a part in the different committees such as Sports, Election, RUSA, Departmental Councils, IQAC, Grievance Redressal Cell etc. which further makes the governance more transparent.

At the beginning of the Academic session Sports Incharge puts a proposal in front of all Committee members about the activities to be conducted, when to be organized, items to be purchased in terms of equipments and clothings. Every member of the committee has equal right to express their view about the proposal and high majority is required to pass that proposal.

Tenders and quotation are also called and the quality can be checked by all the committee members. The item is purchased only after the committee members are satisfied with the quality of the product at the specific price. Sports department conduct atleast one Inter-collegiate sports event and Annual Sports of the college every year and prepare teams to participate in more than twenty Sports activities especially organized by the affiliating University at different levels. In both the events there is participation of students and involvement of committee members along with the other staff of the college.

### 6.2.1 Perspective/Strategic plan and Deployment documents are available in the institution

### **Response:**

PNG Govt. PG College, Ramnagar has been evolving for the past 43 years. It is catering to the higher education needs of the semi-urban and rural people of in and around the town of Ramnagar. The college is working to facilitate a student centric development, enhance social relevance of the institution, strengthening spiritual vitality and identification of sources for mobilization of funds. With the objective to achieve these goals the college has proposed to mobilize funds under the MHRD scheme of RUSA. The college has been approved of a fund of 201.12 Lakhs under RUSA Phase-1, under the component of Conversion of existing college into model college for 2015-18. Under this scheme a New Library building has been constructed, the toilet block, boundary wall and basket ball court are being renovated. Under new

facilities books, lab equipments, smart class, e-library components and office equipments have been purchased. On the same guidelines the college has planned for the RUSA Phase-2 for session 2018-20. The college has been approved a grant of 200 lakhs for the construction of a new Computer Centre and two classrooms along with the renovation of four laboratories, classrooms and toilet block. Books, equipments for labs, smart classrooms and office are to be purchased. The Detailed Project Report is made for the aforesaid plans which is approved by the RUSA Directorate, Dehradun and MHRD, New Delhi. All the relevant documents are maintained and periodic review is done by the Inspection committee, constituted by the Directorate, Higher Education, Uttarakhand Government.

6.2.2 Organizational structure of the institution including governing body, administrative setup, and functions of various bodies, service rules, procedures, recruitment, promotional policies as well as grievance redressal mechanism

**Response:** 

PNG Govt. PG College, Ramnagar is a fully aided college of the Higher Education Department of Uttarakhand Government. The college is headed by the Principal of the college. However, the policies and procedural modalities are made centrally by the Directorate, Higher Education, Uttarakhand Government. The Principal guides the college in academic progress, admission and administrative matters. Principal is the Chairman of the IQAC, Anti-ragging Cell, Proctorial Board, Women's Grievance Redressal Cell, Examination Cell etc. IQAC help the Principal in the overall administration which involves the planning of the academic calendar and its systematic implementation. The Exam Cell Incharge monitors the conduct of the entire examination process. The faculty members play an important role in executing the curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular programmes.

Heads of Departments are responsible for the preparation of Department time-table, work allocation among the teachers of the respective departments.

The recruitment procedure, promotional policies and service rules are as per the rules of Directorate, Higher Education, Uttarakhand Government and the guidelines of UGC.

The college has formed a Grievance Redressal System in the form of Anti-ragging committee, Grievance Redressal Cell, Women's Cell and Internal Complaint Committee (ICC). The Convenors and the committee members of the aforesaid Committees conducts timely meetings to review the working of these committees. The procedures and functioning of these committees has been put up on the Notice Board to promote awareness about the functions of Grievance Redressal system. The teaching, non-teaching and the students take active part in the programs undertaken by the Grievance Redressal System. Suggestion/Grievance Box has also been put up where the complaints can be dropped.

### 6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

### 6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff

One Earned leave is also granted yearly. Six months of Maternity leave is granted to female teachers and 15 days of Paternity Leave is entitled to the male teachers. A provision of two years Child Care Leave (CCL) is available to the Lady teachers having maximum of two children upto their attainment of 18 years.

Department of Higher Education, Uttarakhand provides Residential accommodation to the Principal.

The Department provides Pension scheme to the employee employed before October 2005 and New Pension Scheme (NPS) to the employee after October 2005. Group Provident Fund and Gratuity Schemes are available for all employed staff.

Research Leave is also granted to the teaching staff.

Faculty enhancement programmes are periodically arranged to motivate the staff for Research and Innovation.

Grievance Redressal Cell exist at college to provide solution of various kinds of issues. Internal Complaint Committee (ICC) under Prevention of Sexual Harassment at Workplace is also in existence.

Non-Teaching staff is also provided with the facilities like thirty-one days Earned Leave, fourteen Casual Leave and Bonus once in a year.

Group Insurance, Medical Reimbursement Scheme, Loan facilities are also available as other welfare schemes for both Teaching and Non-teaching staff.

### 6.3.5 Institution has Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff

### **Response:**

The college has 41 teaching faculties of Commerce, Arts and Science stream eight teaching faculties for B.Ed Faculty and two in Self-financing post-graduate course in Yoga. The teaching faculties are evaluated annually on the basis of Annual Confidential Report (ACR) in which the concerned faculty fills up Self-Appraisal Report on the criterion of Academic and Administrative works done during the time period of 01April to 31 March. The details filled by the faculty are verified and recommended with grading of 1-5. The ACR is then send to the Directorate, Higher Education, Uttarakhand Government for the final approval of the Director, Higher Education. The service books of the all the permanent staff are maintained with all the details. The monthly bills of the Guest Faculty are evaluated on the basis of the number of classes taken by them.

The college has 28 permanent Non-teaching staff and 5 contractual staff. They are also evaluated annually on the basis of the Confidential Report. The CR of Chief Administrative Officer and Administrative Officer is verified and recommended with remarks and grading from 1-5 and send to the Directorate, Higher Education, Uttarakhand Government for approval. The CRs of the rest of the non-teaching staff is filed in the college and they are send to the Directorate, Higher Education, Uttarakhand Government at the time of their respective promotions. The service books are also maintained.

The college also conducts Academic and Administrative Audits (AAA) through inspection committees and internal and external auditors.

### 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

### 6.4.1 Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

### **Response:**

The college conducts regular financial audits. The internal audit is done by the Chartered Accountant, who reviews the finances of the college on continoua basis. The auditing committee is appointed by the Controller and Auditor General. The latest audit was done from 15/01/2018 to 18/01/2019 of accounts was done for a period of 09/2013 to 12/2017. The committee had raised objections related to Annual Maintenance Contract, discrepancy in General Provident Fund Book, funds related to postal stamps, incomplete service books, payment of Travel Allowance, cash book maintenance. ### 6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

### **Response:**

PNG Govt. PG College, Ramnagar (Nainital) is a 43 year old Government college, funded by the Uttarakhand Government. The college takes every possible effort towards resource mobilization and generating funds beyond the salary grant received from the Uttarakhand Government. The college caters to the students of the semi-urban and rural areas of in and around the town of Ramnagar. The college makes proposals for grant of funds under the different schemes carried out by the Government of India.

The college has received grants from UGC for the purchase of books. Similarly proposals were made by the college for the funding through RUSA Phase I and Phase II. Under the RUSA 1.0 scheme of the MHRD, Government of India, the college received 201.12 Lakhs funds for new construction of a Library building, renovation of the toilet block, basket ball court and boundary wall along with the purchase of books and equipments under New Facilities. During the session of 2018-20, the college was sanctioned a grant of 200 Lakhs under RUSA 2.0 for new construction of a Computer centre and two classrooms, renovation of laboratories, classrooms and toilet blocks along with the purchase of books and equipments under New Facilities. The funds received under the aforesaid scheme are being utilised as mentioned in the Detailed Project Report.

The college also received funds from the local MLAs and Alumni for the release of funds. The college has received funds for the purchase of books, LCD projectors for the classrooms, White Boards, Water purifiers, beautification of the Flag hoisting area, and any other requirements. The college has also send proposals for compliance of Chief Ministers announcements of renovation of Auditorium, college hall and

boundary. Proposal has also been made for grant of funds for the construction of Women's Hostel under Ministry of Minority and Backward Classes.

# 6.5.2 The institution reviews its teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals through IQAC set up as per norms

### **Response:**

PNG Government PG College, Ramnagar through IQAC periodically reviews and is continuously trying to upgrade the quality of teaching learning process by way of obtaining feedbacks, teaching-learning methods by the way of enhanced ICT equipped classrooms, academic research and timely academic audit for quality assurance. The faculty in the college are encouraged to utilize the modern Information and Communication Technology (ICT) tools. Projects, Assignments and Presentations are made mandatory as a part of the course in order to motivate the students to gain practical knowledge as a part of Personality Development.

In course of reviewing teaching learning outcomes, the college identifies and implements the following initiatives:

- Stakeholders Feedback: The institution is consistently collecting the feedback regarding teaching learning outcomes from the students and teachers. Department of Psychology have prepared Questionaire for students and Teachers by which we collect the information from the same and that has also been analysed and the result always shown on the college website. Student Questionaire is prepared on the basis of curriculum, teaching methods, classroom facilities, whereas questionnaire for teachers is based on Infrastructural facilities, student-teacher relationship and curriculum. Analysed result always help the college to improve teaching learning process.
- Career Counselling Cell:

PNG Govt. PG College, Ramnagar has a separate Career Counselling and Guidance Cell. This cell is administered by a Convenor and three members. The members are the faculty members from all the three faculties; i.e. Arts, Science and Commerce. The Cell has organized many college level seminars, debates and counselling sessions. These sessions are conducted in collaboration with National Banking Agency, TIME Institute, Central Bank of India and other similar institution situated in and around Ramnagar city. The topics in these sessions are awareness about different career opportunities and the preparation needed for them, topics on personality development for bringing a balance in their lives, preparation for job interviews, and creating self employment opportunities in Uttarakhand. The cell also takes initiatives in arranging placement drive, as and when it is possible. However, such drives are very limited due to limited scope of job opportunities in the town.

6.5.5 Incremental improvements made during the preceding five years *(in case of first cycle)* Post accreditation quality initiatives *(second and subsequent cycles)* 

### **Response:**

The institute has implemented various quality enhancement initiatives in different domains in last few years. Some of the incremental improvements made related to academic and administrative domains are:

- Institute took affiliation from Kumaon University, Nainital for MA History and MSc Physics in 2016-17 and MA Yoga in 2019-20. All the three courses are running effectively now.
- College got sanctioned four teaching posts from the Department of Higher Education, Government of Uttarakhand (two in History and two in Physics Department).
- The college initiated E-library and now is having E-library with 16 computers to facilitate students and teachers.
- The college is also under the process of digitization of library. Till date around 20,000 books have been uploaded to the software and it is still in process with SOUL 2.0 and N-List software.
- Upgradation of Laboratories: All Science laboratories have been upgraded with state of the art facilities and equipments benefitting both students and Research scholars.
- Wi-Fi Facilities: the entire Administrative Block of the college is Wi-Fi enabled with Jio networking. Students and faculty of the college have assess to the internet for Academic Purposes.
- Sports and Cultural activities: Fitness for all is ensured through sports and games. The college has well versed sports department that provides opportunities to all the students be selected in more than fifteen games orgainsed during the year. Atleast one Inter-collegiate sports and one Annual sports is organised every year. Students of the college also organize and participate in annual cultural festival in which the students encouraged by awarding them in their specific fields.

PNG Government PG College, Ramnagar is situated in the small town, famous for Jim Corbett sanctuary. The college serves the higher educational needs of surrounding villages and town. So the students come from different socio-economic and financial backgrounds. More than 55 percent students of the college are girls which creates the basic need of gender sensitivity.

Safety and Security: The College has set up Women's Grievance Redressal Cell and Internal Complaint Committee (ICC) to deal with the problems and bring about awareness related to different laws and government facilities for the females. The Cell conducts seminar, highlighting the issues on security and safety of females on Women's Day i.e. 08 Mar every year.

Counselling: NSS, NCC and Rovers Rangers conducts rallies on Government program of 'Beti Bacchao Beti Padhao'. The faculty members counsel the female students during their interactions to enhance awareness on women empowerment and career issues. The female students were also counselled to promote their voting rights in the election.Career Counselling Cell is separately situated in the college and many of the programs, seminars and interactionns are conducted with the reputed organizations and intellectuals.

Common Room: The College also has separate Girls Common Room and a Female faculty member is made In-charge of it. In case of any medical problem the concerned faculty member can be contacted. The college has a separate post for Vice-President (Female) in the Student Union. This promotes the participation of females in the Student Union.

The Cleaning Staff collects the garbage every morning and dumps in the pits, later the Garbage Collecting Vehicle from the Nagar Pallika, Ramnagar collects the garbage of the entire. The students and teachers share their views on the teachings on Mahatma Gandhi. Rally for communal harmony is taken out by the cadets of NCC, NSS and Rovers-Rangers wing.

#### The Context:

The community – based learning combines traditional classroom instruction with community service to enhance the learning of the students and civic participation. The college focus for community improvement and engagement connects academic program with community service so that students, faculty and community partners can forge linkage between theory and practice, between knowledge and action and between the resources of institution and the community development.

#### **Objectives of the practice:**

The objective of the practice is to engage the students and the faculty members to create closer ties with college and the local community through NSS/NCC/Rovers-Rangers which will result in deepening the quality of learning and discovery.

Higher Education institutions are the centers for new voters. It is important that the students understand the importance of casting their votes in the elections. The voter awareness program aim at engaging the students in different activities such as Rallies, signature campaigns, street dramas, etc., which help in creating awareness about the responsibility of casting vote among the general public and themselves. The final aim is to create awarenessn among Public and make people responsive.

#### The Practice:

PNG Govt. PG College, Ramnagar has a very active NSS, NCC and Roevrs & Rangers wing. Throughout the year the faculty members and the students associated with these wings engage themselves in different

activities related to community engagement. These activities emphasise on development of social responsibility among the young citizens of the country. The students organize activities like Lecture series, street drama, tree plantation, cleanliness programs, awareness programs against addiction, etc. The programs are organized on the occasion of National Festivals and other days of importance related to Universal Values and Ethics like Vijay Diwas, National Integration Day, World Aids Day, Women's Day, World Environment Day etc. The students have also participated in collection of data for ASER and in the programs related to Gender Sensitization.

Institute also organizes regular blood donation camps. During the last four years the college has organized blood donation camps on Aids Day, Vijay Diwas, Vivekanand Jayanti, etc. These blood donation camps are organized in collaboration with LD Bhatt Govt. Hospital, Kashipur. The blood is stored and transported with the help of LD Bhatt Govt. Hospital, Kashipur. On the whole the college collected 210 units of blood. The NSS/ NCC/ Rovers and Rangers units of the college ensure timely awareness of the camps. The students, faculty members and the people of surrounding actively participate in the blood donation camps. The blood units collected are used by the hospital in the treatment of the poor patients.

The students of NSS/NCC/Rovers and Rangers of the PNG Government PG College, Ramnagar actively participate in Voters awareness program in collaboration with the District Coordinator and the Nodal Officer of **Systematic Voter Education and Electoral Participation (SVEEP)**. Rallies were taken out in the town of Ramnagar in which the students participated with banners in their hands and pronouncing slogans made by them to motivate people for their active participation in election as a voter. Guest Lecture was arranged for the students on the topic 'Role of Voters in Elections'. The College arranged for Special Lecture on the procedures of making of Voter ID cards for both new and old voters on the occasion of National Voters Day i.e. 25 January 2019 with the objective to make cent percent voting . Voters Awareness Seminar was organized by the NSS/NCC in collaboration with SVEEP representatives in which the students took signatures from the general public and from the students and staff of the college. A Special awareness program was also organized for the **Physically Challenged Voters**. Throughout the academic year different activities were carried out to promote registration and participation of the voters in the town of Ramnagar through the students and staff of the college.

#### Obstacles faced and strategies adopted to overcome them:

- Obstacles faced include inadequacy of resources; non-availability of latest technology for operating the blood transfusion services.
- We arranged lots of awareness program but public shows less consideration.

#### Impact of the practice:

NSS and NCC organizes lots of community engagement programs in the particular town and nearby villages which creates awareness about Drug abuses, Gender sensitivity, Cleanliness and Scarcity of Water etc.

The practice promotes community feelings among the students and the staff of the college. It helps in promoting personality development, moral education and civic responsibility. The hospital caters the blood related needs of the rural population of Kashipur and Ramnagar. Such blood donations help the hospital in creating an emergency blood bank for themselves. At the college level a data bank is created with the name, address and blood group of the student or staff and in case of emergency the data bank is used to call the donors for the required.

The present scenario of the Indian politics has created much distrust and lack of confidence among the general public. It is imperative that the new voters understand that not casting the vote will only aggravate the negative scenario in the political arena, which will be harmful in the socio-economic development of the country. Hence there is a dire need that the Voter Awareness programs are encouraged in the colleges. Further the students also participate to encourage other voters in casting their votes in the election. With this goal the Government of India has launched Systematic Voter Education and Electoral Participation (SVEEP). This program involves students studying in the Higher Education Institutions in creating awareness about the Voting system and importance of Electoral participation.

#### **Resources required**:

- This is a philanthropic work so no resources are allotted but the donors are distributed with snacks and a small token of appreciation which is provided by the hospital.
- Financial resources were arranged by the District Coordinator of SVEEP. The college is a Government institution so no separate fund is available for such programs. NSS/NCC/Rovers and Rangers deal with the need of human resources needed in the organisation and implementation of the Voter Awareness Program.

#### Title of the Practice: Innovation and Incubation

**Objective of the Practice:** 

- To improve student instruction and services through student feedback.
- To help students in their personality development and creating awareness about different career opportunities through Career Counseling and Guidance Cell.

#### Need Addressed and the Context:

Students and teachers are the major stakeholders of Education institutions, having their own set of priorities and needs. It becomes imperative to assess their perception for improvement in the planning and performance of the institution. Hence, feedback is obtained from both the teachers and the students.

PNG Govt. PG College, Ramnagar is located in the urban area of District Nainital. Ramnagar is a small town of the district famous for Jim Corbett Tiger Reserve. The college caters to the needs of the rural areas

surrounding the town, so the students are usually from rural background, majority being female. The Career Counseling and Guidance session organized by Career Counseling Cell creates awareness among the students about the different career opportunities. Along with awareness programs, sessions for personality development and preparatory sessions for competitive examinations help the students.

#### **The Practice:**

With the objective of improving the academic and administrative performance of the college, feedback system was incorporated in the college from 2015-16. This also an initiative taken post accreditation. The college designed the feedback form for the students as well as for the teachers with the help of the faculty members of the Department of Psychology. The feedback form for the students covered three major areas of curriculum, classroom teaching and administrative facilities. The feedback form of the teachers covered the questions related to infrastructural facilities availability in the college, the discipline and attendance issues of the students and the research & development issues related to the teachers. The feedback form was filled by the students – subject-wise – and submitted to the respective teachers. After that the forms are given to the faculty members of the Psychology, who analyse, interpret and submit the conclusions to IQAC. Similarly, the teachers feedback is analysed. The interpretations are uploaded on the website and the recommendations are made on the basis of the interpretations in the IQAC meeting. Efforts are made to bring about improvements in the next academic session.

PNG Govt. PG College, Ramnagar has a separate Career Counseling and Guidance Cell. This cell is administered by a Convener and three members. The members are the faculty members from all the three faculties; i.e. Arts, Science and Commerce. The Cell has organized many college level seminars, debates and counseling sessions. These sessions are conducted in collaboration with National Banking Agency, TIME Institute, Central Bank of India and other similar institution situated in and around Ramnagar city. The topics in these sessions are awareness about different career opportunities and the preparation needed for them, topics on personality development for bringing a balance in their lives, preparation for job interviews, and creating self employment opportunities in Uttarakhand. The cell also takes initiatives in arranging placement drive, as and when it is possible. However, such drives are very limited due to limited scope of job opportunities in the town.

#### **Evidence of Success**

The feedback is uploaded on the website and the recommendations were made applicable for future.

Students and alumni evaluation shows that this practice has helped them to feel relaxed, free to talk, share and communicate better on matters of career opportunities.

#### **Resources:**

No financial resources are needed for the feedback system. The stationery etc., needed is provided from the Office of the college. The Human resources in terms of expert teachers are needed for the development of questionnaire and to analysis of the same which is taken from the Department of Psychology.

There is no financial commitment in this program. The Career Counseling and Guidance Cell arranges for the sessions in collaboration with related institutions and the members of the related institution visits the

college to counsel and guide the students

## **5. CONCLUSION**

## **Additional Information :**

The college is filing the SSR report as a process for Reaccreditation by NAAC in the third cycle. The college has been accredited with Grade 'B+' and Grade 'B' in the last two cycles and is working to achieve higher score at the accreditation. The college was able to mobilise funds of 201 lakhs under RUSA Phase I and 200 Lakhs under RUSA Phase 2. This funding has helped the college upgradation and renovation works along with New construction of Library building which has completed and Computer Centre with two classrooms which under process. RUSA funding helped the college in the purchase of books and equipments for laboratories, computer centre and office.

## **Concluding Remarks :**

PNG Government PG College, Ramnagar as catered to the higher education needs for the last 43 years. The college has tried its best to lay emphasis on the education for the students hailing from different socioeconomic, cultural and religious backgrounds downtrodden. The college has mobilized funds for infrastructural augmentation from State Government, RUSA Scheme and MLA Charity funds. More than fifty percent of the students are females, which is an important demographic feature of the college. Research and extension activities are carried out by the teachers through publication of research papers, conduct of Seminars and Workshops, Research projects etc. Students of the college are actively engaged in extra-curricular activities like Sports, Cultural events, social engagement through NCC, NSS and Rovers-Rangers, Departmental activities, celebration of National festivals and birth/ death anniversaries of eminent personalities. Career awareness and placement efforts are continuously made by the college through Career Counselling Cell. A well equipped library is also available for academic enrichment of both teachers and students. The process of automation of the library is under-way. To help the economically weaker students the college has a provision of a Boy's Hostel to accommodate forty students. The students of SC, ST and OBC are also availing the scholarship facility provided by the college under different Schemes of the State government. The college is also under the process of implementation of e-governance with the use of IFMS, PFMS, MIS updation, e-tendering, purchase of goods through e-Gem, online admission and examination procedures. The college is providing quality and advanced education to rural masses through ICT enabled teaching-learning methods and hence it shows our strength in the quest for excellence.

The college has shown positive changes since its establishment in academics and administration. It has achieved various milestones over the years. However, dependency of the college on Government policies and University norms, has restricted its growth path. Even after continuous efforts of the administration of the college, new teaching posts have not been sanctioned by the Department of Higher Education. The college lacks in its facility of Waste management, rain-water harvesting and energy creation through alternate sources.
